## Briarhoppers Getting Together

"I have had three heart attacks and multiple bypass surgery," the former star of the Briarhopper radio program said Thursday in a telephone interview from Charlotte "But I still like to get out on the stage and jump around the microphone as much as I can..."

That entertainer, a young 76, is Garnett "Fiddlin' Hank" Warren, a Mount Airy native who will be one of the featured performers this weekend in The Charlotte Country Music Story. The tribute to Carólina musician, who-played an important role in early country music is sponsored by the N.C. Arts Council in partnership with Spirit Square of Charlotte.

There will be two concerts, tonight and Saturday evening Both will feature recreations of the famed WBT radio "Briarhopper Show" with the original cast, including Warren.

In addition to the Briarhoppers, the Charlotte event will bring together among others. Bill Monroe, legendary Father of Bluegrass. Arthur Smith, Snuffy Jenkins: Homer "Pappy" Sherrill and the Tennessee Ramblers.

"All the seats have been reserved for the Saturday show," Warren said, the pride evident in his voice, "Between eighty and ninety percent of the seats have been sold for Friday."

The former Granite Citian and his fellow Briarhoppers will perform for one hour, from 8 to 9 o'clock, at Spirit Square tonight, "with other acts coming on after us," Warren said

"Saturday night, we will perform for one hour. Bill Monroe will be the second act."

Warren has been described by people in the business as "one of the most versatile of the Briarhoppers."

He joined the favorite radio program of thousands of Carolinians in the late 1930s or early 1940s and became not only the group's fiddler but their baggy-pants comedian. Photos of the band from that decade feature. Hank — made up with freckles, take glasses and blacked-out teeth — cutting capers with

his fiddle or even standing on his head.

Few listeners realized that Warren had enough formal training to play with the Charlotte Symphony, or that his skill at sight-reading allowed him to act as the Briarhoppers' musical director during the busy days following World War II when composers deluged the band with song sheets.

Made Movie With Autry

It was a long road from Mount Airy to Charlotte for the versatile entertainer, whose 50-year career in entertainment has included a movie with Gene Autry.

Mrs. Hopper, 70, went back to school in 1966. In the last 14 years she has worked in sales at Ivey's. Mrs. Warren also has been working on an old dream of hers — painting.

The Warrens, who married Aug. 10, 1931 in Hillville, Va., attribute their "long and happy marriage to love, respect, honor and the ability to understand the other and work our problems out." They live on Dunaire Drive.

### Homespun alent focus of festival

It wasn't really an unusual sight n a summer Saturday afternoon: diverse crowd of young couples tie-dyed T-shirts, businessmen a ties, senior citizens and foreign xchange students listening to luegrass music and sipping cool rinks.

But this scene took place in lowntown Raleigh, a site that nore often resembles a ghost own on weekends.

"I think it's neat," said Tom ladger of Raleigh. "There's a eally interesting mix of people. They ought to have more like it."

Badger was one of about 1,000 people who gathered in the shade of the oaks on Moore Square and wandered through the restored My Market to experience the raditional music and crafts of the Piedmont at the ArtsPlosure Heriage Festival.

The shade, a cool breeze, cold drinks and ice cream helped the estival visitors endure the 95-degree temperatures while they sampled a smorgasbord of blues, oluegrass and folk singers as well as Mike Cross's personal brand of nusic and humor.

The festival, which continues oday, was the first major event in he \$8.4 million City Market restoation, the cornerstone of the ity's downtown revitalization eforts. The City of Raleigh asked ArtsPlosure officials to hold the estival downtown to attract new enants and the public to City darket, festival organizers said.

"The focus of this festival is on he traditional music and crafts of he Piedmont with an emphasis on orth Carolina pottery," said Dine S. Bothwell, acting director of rtsPlosure.

She said that the art of making ottery was passed down through amilies in the region and that nany of the potters at the festival ere relatives.

# Original Briarhopper Hank Warren dies at 88

Garnett "Hank" Warren, one of the last surviving original Briarhoppers, died Wednesday morning

at Lakeview Living Center.

Warren, 88, was the fiddler for the Briarhoppers, a legendary string band that performed live on WBT radio for 30 years. The band, which played throughout the Carolinas, regrouped 20 years ago and tours the country.

Warren fell ill about four years ago and hadn't played with the band since. But that doesn't mean members won't miss "Fiddlin' Hank," who could play a fiddle and

do a bird imitation at the same time.

"Hank is the best comic fiddle

player that any of us have ever seen," said Roy "Whitey" Grant, 81.

Warren was a native of Mount Airy and used to have jam sessions with Andy Griffith, who plays guitar, Grant said. About Warren



four years ago, Warren started missing notes and decided it was time to stop playing, Grant said. Warren suggested the group replace him with 54-year-old Dwight Moody - a young 'un by their standards.

Warren is survived by his wife, Inez Warren; two sons, Roy Warren of Monroe and Larry Warren of Pineville; two daughters, Joy Thomas of Mint Hill and Jean Carlson of Farmington, Utah; a brother, Jack Warren of Mount Airy; six grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

The funeral will be at 11 a.m. Friday at McEwen Funeral Home in Mint Hill with the Rev. Grady Faulk officiating. Interment will follow in Evergreen City Cemetery. Garnett "Hank" Warren, 88, of Charlotte, died Wednesday, December 17, 1997 at Lakeview Living Center.



Funeral services will be 11 a.m. Friday, December 19, at McEwen Mint Hill Chapel with Reverend Grady J. Faulk officiating. Interment will follow in Evergreen City Cemetery. The family will re-

ceive friends from 7-9 p.m. this eve-

Mr. Warren, better known as "Fiddling Hank", was a native of Mt. Airy, NC. He was a musician and photographer, retiring after 40 years service with WBT Radio and WBT Television. He was a member of the Briarhoppers Band which was formed in the 1940's. The band traveled throughout North and South Carolina, playing in schools, churches and orphanages. He was a member of the Photographers Association and the Musicians Union.

### Veteran Briarhopper "Hank" Warren Dies

One of WBT Radio's most popular and widely-know retirees, Garnett B. "Hank" Warren, died December 17. He was 88 years old.

Known to countless thousands across the Carolinas and elsewhere as "Fiddlin' Hank," he was one of the original members of the legendary WBT Briarhoppers. The Briarhoppers performed on WBT for 30 years, later regrouped and continue to play around the country today. "Hank" was noted for his humorous contributions to



Briarhopper performances and for his ability to coax a haunting melody out of a carpenter's saw.

In addition to his musical talents, "Hank"

served as the company photographer, chronicling station events and visiting celebrities from U.S. presidents to Hollywood and TV stars. For many years, he provided almost all of the photographs appearing in *The Jeffcaster*.

Survivors include his wife of 66 years, Inez T. Warren; two sons, two daughters, one brother, six grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren.
